Andrew McLaughlin, the nation's deputy chief technology officer, made a number of statements when recounting how the Chinese government subverts free speech on the Internet. In one he stated "if it bothers you that the China government does it, it should bother you when your cable company does it."

The response statement below can be attributed to Jim Cicconi, AT&T senior executive vice president of external and legislative affairs.

"It is deeply disturbing when someone in a position of authority, like Mr. McLaughlin, is so intent on advancing his argument for regulation that he equates the outright censorship decisions of a communist government to the network congestion decisions of an American ISP. There is no valid comparison, and it's frankly an affront to suggest otherwise.

"Mr. McLaughlin's statements are ill-considered and inflammatory. They describe a supposed threat to free speech by ISPs that simply does not exist, and seem designed to manufacture a 'crisis' in order to justify regulations that could damage investment and jobs.

"The American communications system has always been a model for openness and freedom of speech. The Internet era is no exception. The FCC's current open Internet rules have ensured the entire ecosystem remains open for consumers. However, the irony is that the FCC is now considering narrowing those successful principles in a way that will exclude Google, a major Internet gatekeeper. If any entity on the Internet today has the ability to chill voices with which it disagrees, that entity is Mr. McLaughlin's former employer. Google, unlike America's ISPs, is a company with market dominance in Internet search and a business model that involves content management. To suggest that companies operating in a highly competitive market are more able to operate as 'gatekeepers' on the Internet, and thus more appropriate targets for government regulation, than a company like Google, which has clear market dominance, is to turn logic on its head.

"Rather than attempting to smear those American companies spending billions to build out broadband and create good jobs in a difficult economy, it would be far better for Mr. McLaughlin to reconsider his remarks... and perhaps to begin working with us on ways to ensure we can continue to invest and create jobs."

Why the White House is backing away from Net neutrality

The Obama administration and its allies at the Federal Communications
Commission are retreating from a militant version of Net neutrality
regulations first outlined by FCC Chairman Julius Genachowski in
September.

That's my reading of a number of recent developments, underscored by
comments made by government speakers on a panel on the first day of a
Tech Policy Summit at CES in Las Vegas.

Genachowski had initially described his vision for the future role of
the FCC as a "smart cop on the beat preserving a free and open
Internet." Communications companies understood that to mean aggressive
and detailed enforcement of rules that would, among other things,

prohibit ISPs from offering premium, or "fast lane," services.

Such services, which content providers could use to prioritize their interactions with customers over the parts of the Internet controlled by the ISPs, have yet to be offered. But the possibility that they would be ignited a firestorm in 2007 that has grown hotter since the election of President Obama, who proclaimed himself in favor of Net neutrality regulation during the 2008 campaign. Early in his administration, Obama appointed Genachowski, a longtime adviser, as the new head of the FCC. Last fall, Genachowski proposed six Net neutrality rules and asked the full commission to approve them. The proposed rules could be adopted as early as spring.

But even as the commission concludes its collection of public comments next week, both the White House and the FCC appear to be dialing back their expectations.

So Bill has known these guys 7 years and trusts them up to a point (meaning this is a bad situation for everyone). I just finished a long detailed chat session so get ready to geek-out on power - I want to give you everything I've found out rather than my opinion.

This is for the Boutilliers Hill site. It is the main connection point for most of the data traffic and some percentage of the voice traffic including DigiCell. It is the start of the microwave backhaul to DR.

I understand the local staff have been pulling local favors to get fuel at about 50 to 100 gallons each time. I do not believe that the US response staff on the ground understand that the cell providers are dependent on this site because thus far there has been no "official" State or USAID or DoD fuel deliveries.

They have two 300 gallon tanks for a total of 600 gallons. Each tank supports a single 60kva diesel generator. They have two generators. The tanks are not cross connected.

Right now they are running each generator in 8 hour cycles. They do not need to run both concurrently.

The tanks are protected and locked and there is staff manning the site but based on what I understand it would be advisable to get them some protection if resources can be spared.

Additionally they have a large battery bank with reasonably fresh batteries but they were scheduled to install more so they don't have enough capacity. It is common for them to run on the

batteries and they do that regularly even in normal times because of the historic instability of the power grid. Right now they are letting the battery charge drop low prior to recharge because of the need to stretch the limited fuel supply. This will shorten the battery life depending on how low they let it go. Hopefully not below 25% charge but I wouldn't bet on that.

INDOCEL is scheduled to show up and share about 100 of their gallons - that's about 12 hour's worth. They have not yet made it to the site yet however.

Also - it's a diesel generator and if they run dry they're a bitch to restart because there's usually sludge in the bottom of the tanks that gets "ingested" into the engine. You never want to run a diesel engine to the bottom of the tank - ever.

On chat with them now - it's Skype so it's up and down and reads "pending" right now. Congestion is now a problem on the network. It was fine at 11am but latency is way up. We need some big QoS boxes to step on that. Getting them is not a problem - getting them there is the problem.
